

Would you like to tell to us about your experience of cancer treatment as a Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual or Trans patient?

Why we are doing this study:

We have been commissioned by Macmillan to ask you about your experiences and views of the care you have received.

Medical consultations about having cancer are stressful for all patients; however, Lesbian Gay, Bisexual and Trans (LGBT) people face the extra worry of deciding if, when and how to disclose their sexual orientation or gender identity. They may worry about healthcare professionals reacting badly or be fearful about their sexual orientation or gender identity becoming known.

We would like to talk to you about:

- Were you able to disclose your sexual orientation or gender identity to your cancer professionals?
- Did you feel you wanted to disclose, but didn't feel able to?
- Did you have access to LGBT-focussed information about your cancer treatment?
- Which professionals are supporting you through your treatment
- Do you feel you have been treated like a whole person by the cancer professionals you've come into contact with?

I want to find out more, what do I do?

We want to talk to people with the whole range of experiences of care and support from good to mixed, and where you feel there's room for improvement.

The interview will take place at a time and place of your choosing. It will take somewhere between 45-90 minutes.
